RCCA Conference 2022 Keynote Speaker Biographies



James Kvaal, Senior Fellow, National Center for Inquiry & Improvement

James Kvaal was confirmed by the U.S. Senate as the under secretary on September 14, 2021. Kvaal formerly was president of The Institute for College Access & Success (TICAS), a research and advocacy nonprofit dedicated to affordability and equity in higher education. TICAS is nationally recognized for its research and policy recommendations on student debt.

Kvaal served in the Obama Administration as the deputy domestic policy advisor at the White House and deputy undersecretary at the U.S. Department of Education. He led efforts to cut student loan monthly payments, hold career colleges accountable for excessive debts, and make community colleges tuition-free. He helped organize the White House Summit on College Opportunity, which featured more than 100 college presidents and other leaders com mitting to actions to help more students graduate from college. He also has served in senior roles in the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate.

Kvaal taught at the University of Michigan's Ford School of Public Policy, and graduated with honors from Stanford University and Harvard Law School.



Chris Baldwin PhD, Senior Fellow, National Center for Inquiry & Improvement

As a long time advocate for student success, Chris Baldwin has spent 20 years promoting practices and policies that streamline and accelerate student pathways to a postsecondary credential while increasing equitable outcomes. Baldwin joined the National Center for Inquiry & Improvement (NCII) in 2022 to continue this important work. His focus is supporting institutional efforts to implement guided pathways — especially at rural community colleges — and establishing leadership development programs to create a pipeline of college leaders to equitably expand student success.

Prior to NCII, Baldwin led his own consulting business through which he partnered with college and state leaders to advance the college completion agenda. He has also served as associate vice president at Jobs for the Future (JFF), directing efforts to expand the number of Student Success Centers nationally. This work followed four years as the founding executive director of the Michigan Center for Student Success, a previous stint at JFF leading the state policy component of the Achieving the Dream initiative, and a senior leadership role as vice president at Owens Community College.



Dr. Twyla Baker, President, Nueta Hidatsa Sahnish College

Dr. Twyla Baker is an enrolled citizen of the Three Affiliated Tribes of North Dakota. Born and raised on the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation, Dr. Baker left home for several years and built a life away from the reservation, though she maintained strong ties to her home community. Viewing life through an Indigenous lens, her world view informs nearly everything she does professionally and personally. Dr. Baker is raising her children to know, see, and carry on their Tribal life ways as they were taught to her by her parents and community. Dr. Baker has spent a lifetime establishing her credibility among her Tribal people and with external constituencies. She has published creative and scholarly works in various media, and has made appearances on CNN, MSNBC, and BBC offering commentary and insight on numerous topics impacting Indian Country in the U.S.

Prior to that, she was a K-12 classroom teacher in Florida, having taught French and reading for a total of 11 years.

Dr. Cronin has served on several Florida Department of Education committees and advisory groups and as the Florida delegate for the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education in Washington, D.C. Currently, she serves on the American Association of Community Colleges' Commission on Small & Rural Colleges, The Dalles Community Outreach Team, and the Hood River County Economic Development Group. Dr. Cronin is a board member on the Mid-Columbia Economic Development District board of directors and the Rural Community College Alliance and serves as the vice chair of the East Cascades Works Workforce board. She has also been involved in several state and national COVID recovery efforts, representing the college on the American Association of Community College/National Governor's Association Reskilling and Recovery Network and through Oregon Governor Brown's North Central Region Equity in Recovery Council.
